#### **PURPOSE**

To ensure the safety of patients and reduce fall risk consistent with hospital wide fall prevention protocols.

#### **POLICY**

## For inpatients:

All staff will be cognizant of nursing assessment of risk to fall and follow guidelines and interventions implemented:

Patients who are at NORMAL/LOW RISK: Total score 1-4, will have the following implemented in addition to standard measures:

- Side rail position (2, 3, half).
- Yellow socks for ambulatory patients

Patients assessed at **MODERATE RISK** 5 - 9 score will have all the following implemented in addition to #1 and standard measures:

- Identify patient with yellow arm band and yellow star sticker on chart.
- Yellow "falling star" posted outside patient room to identify which bed (door or window) is at risk for all inpatient units on the third floor.
- Night light left on (evening/night shift).
- Supervised elimination (if assessment indicates) every 2 hours if possible.

Patients with **HIGH RISK** score 10 or above will have all the following implemented in addition to #1 # 2 and standard measures:

- Bed alarm or TABS monitor
- Educate family regarding patient's risk level and what they can do to provide safety.
- Consider a self-release belt to remind patient to stay in chair when out of bed.
- Chair Pad alarms when patient out of bed. If available.
- Yellow Blanket when patient is off unit or out of bed, for the patient that had a bed alarm or TABS monitor in use.

### For outpatients:

<u>All clients</u> in outpatient areas will be considered <u>at risk for fall</u> during the therapy services due to the nature of treatments provided.

Clients will be monitored accordingly by the treating therapist during a session (within reason) and provided appropriate assistance to assure their safety (i.e. clients being oriented to new equipment).

Certain circumstances where the client is at significantly <u>high</u> risk for fall will mitigate direct assistance/supervision with any activity. Examples of these situations include (but not limited to): clients assessed to have significant balance deficit; clients with vision deficit; clients who easily fatigue with activity; clients who score at high risk on standardized tests (i.e. Tinetti, Functional Reach, Berg Balance); etc. For these cases, the evaluating therapist will place a sticker on the outpatient medical record to reflect need for increased awareness for fall risk.
